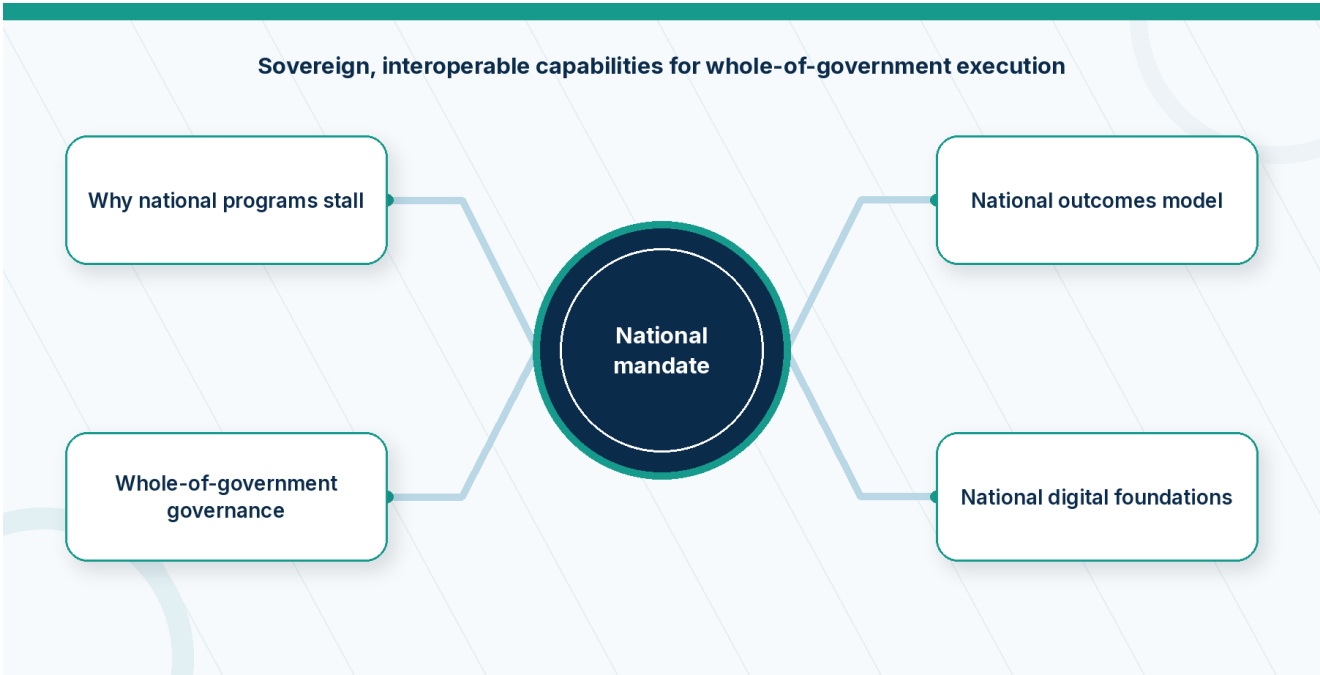

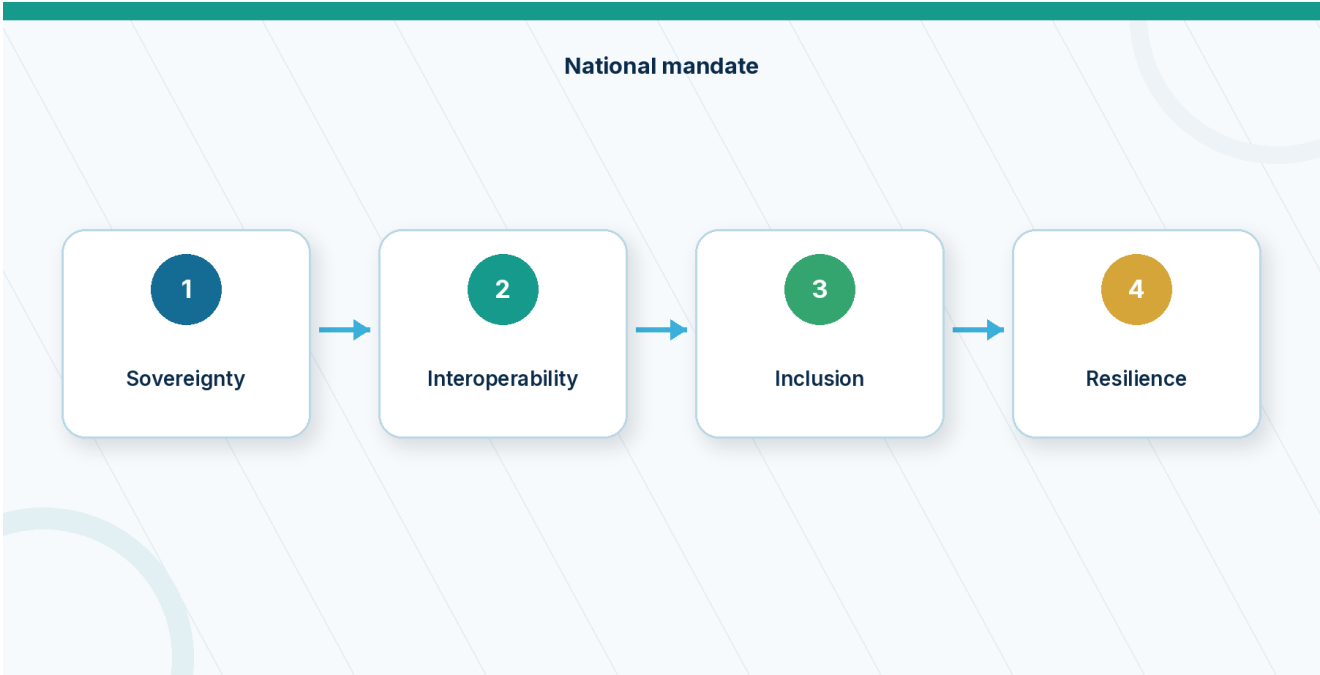
How to use this framework

National mandate

From disconnected projects to durable national capabilities

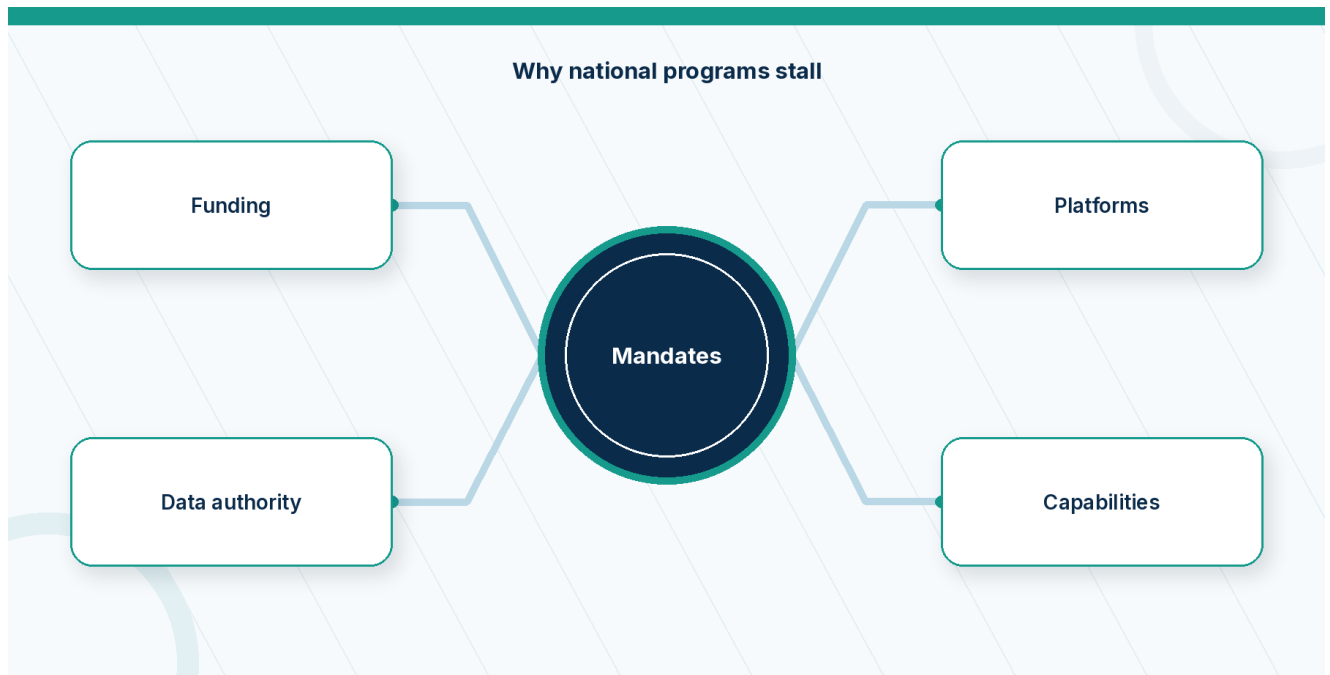


National transformation succeeds when institutions can act independently while sharing trusted foundations, common standards and a coherent route from policy to execution.

Why national programs stall

The failure is often structural—not technological

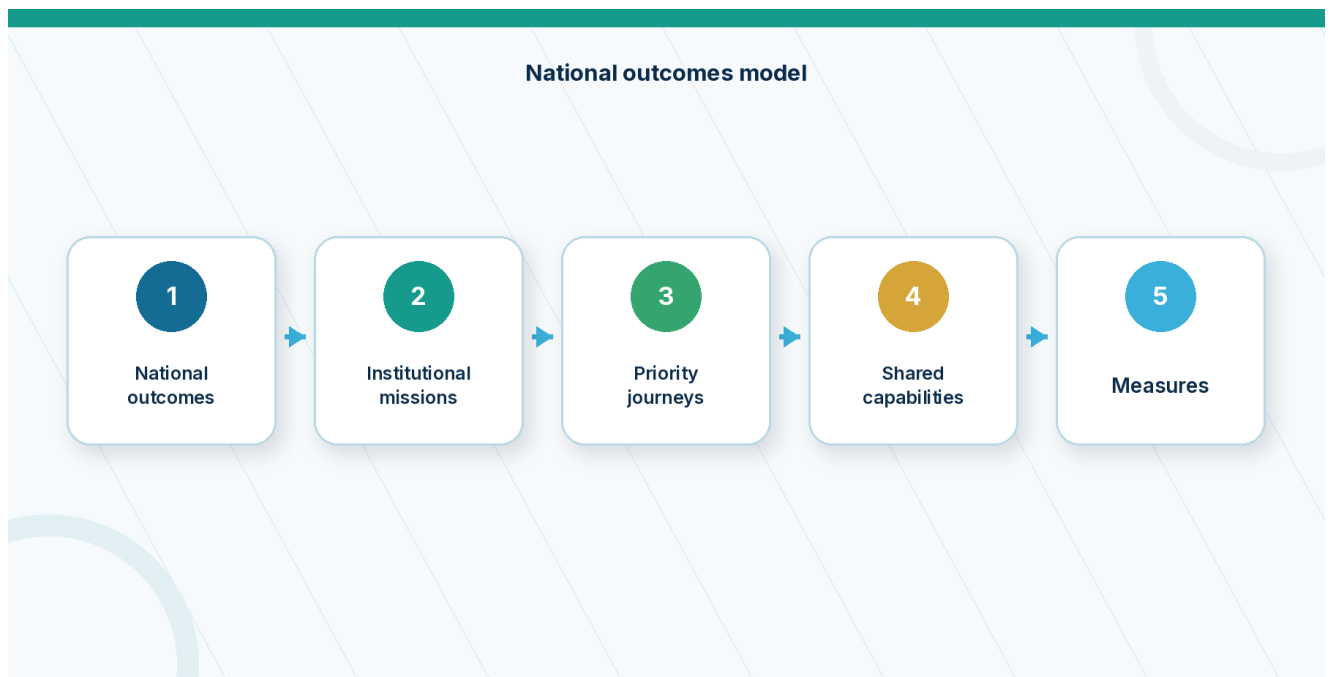


Fragmented mandates, project funding, duplicated platforms, unclear data authority and uneven institutional capability prevent national investments from compounding.

National outcomes model

Translate ambition into measurable public value

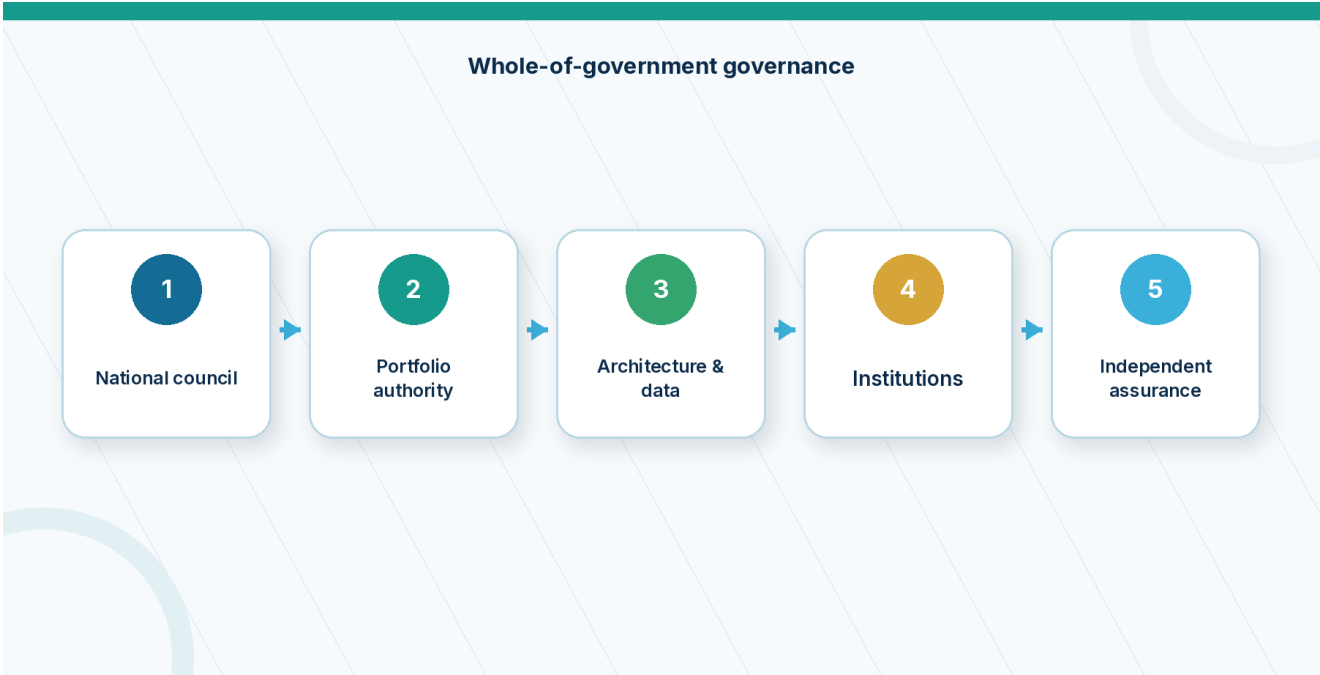


A national portfolio should connect policy outcomes to institutional missions, priority journeys, shared capabilities and measurable indicators. Technology is an enabler inside this chain—not the outcome.

Whole-of-government governance

Federated execution with common guardrails

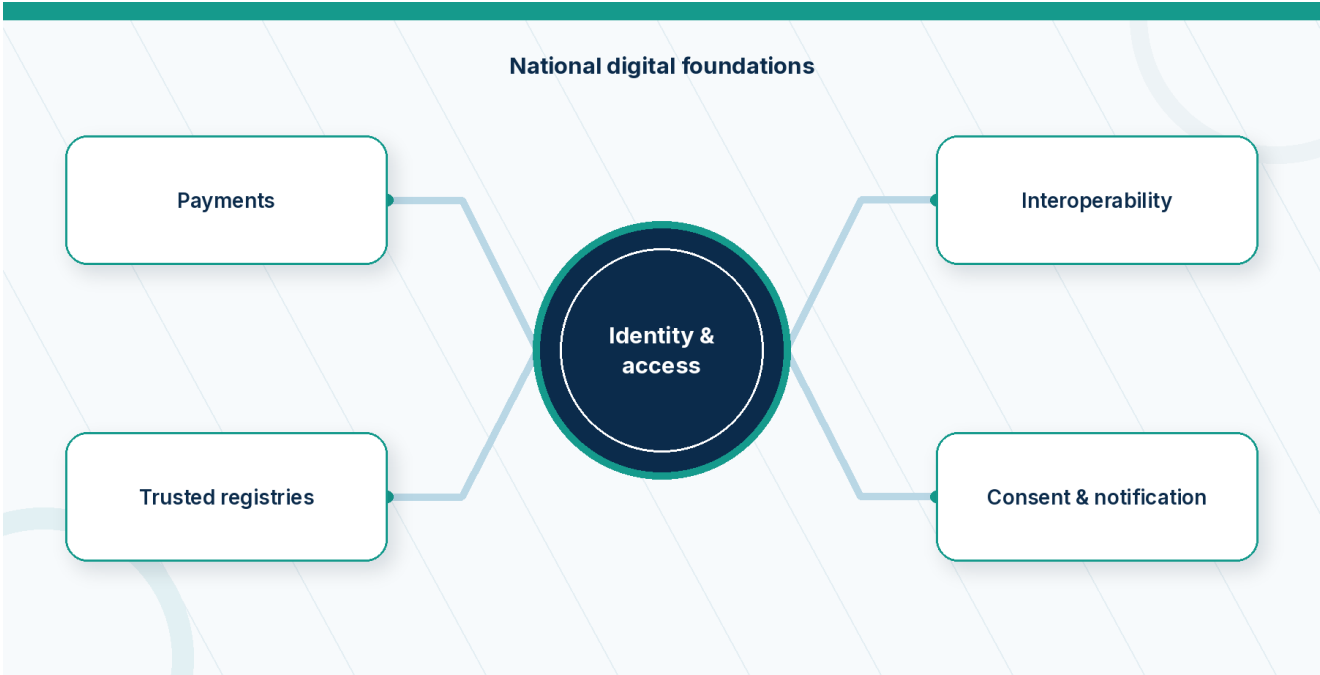


A central authority stewards standards and shared assets while institutions remain accountable for service outcomes. Portfolio, architecture, data and assurance functions create a common decision system.

National digital foundations

Shared capabilities that institutions can safely reuse

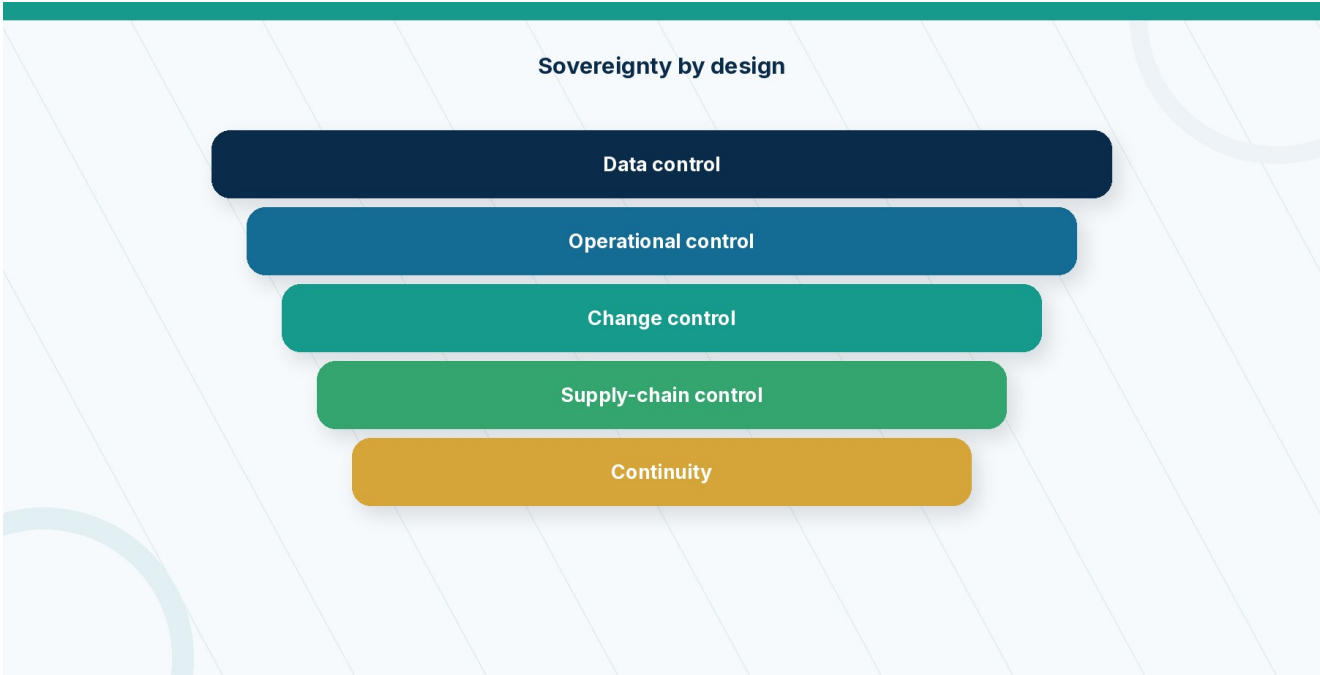


Common identity, payments, notifications, interoperability, consent and trusted registries reduce duplication and create consistent controls—without centralizing every service.

Sovereignty by design

Control data, operations, change and critical dependencies

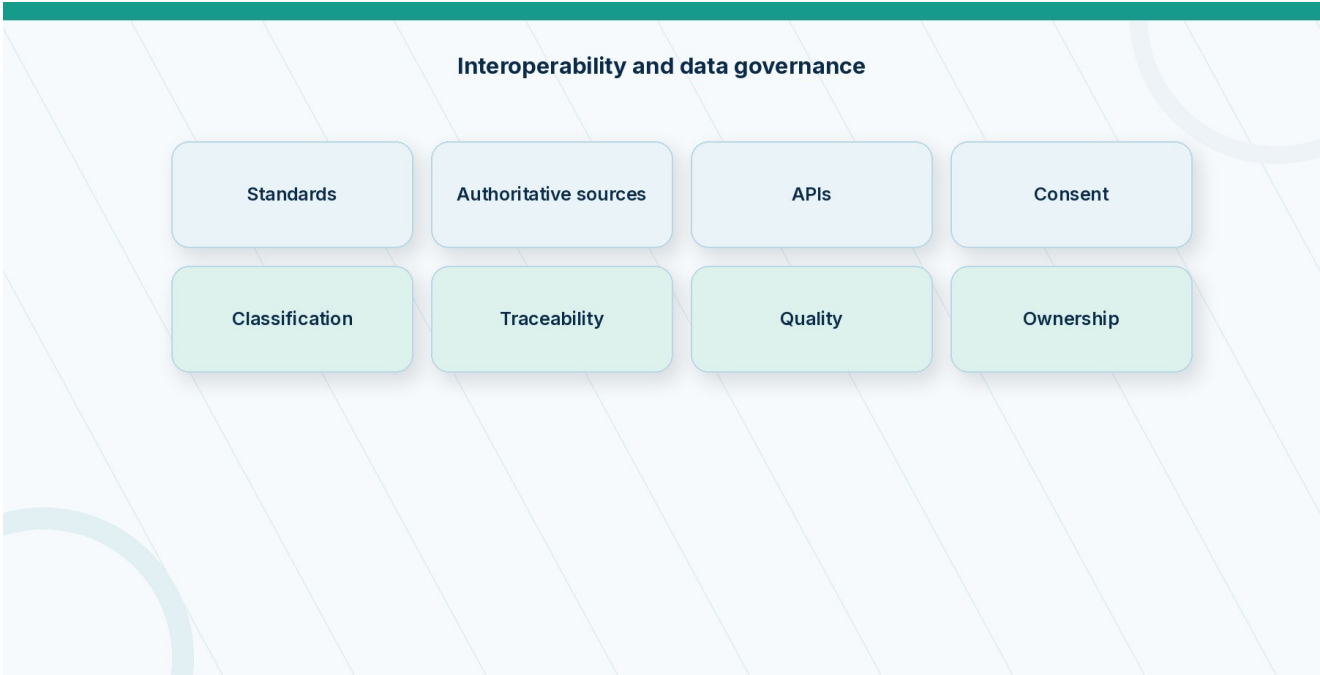


Digital sovereignty is operational: clear ownership, deployable architecture, controlled access, auditable change, local capability and tested continuity. Procurement alone cannot provide it.

Interoperability and data governance

Make exchange a governed national capability

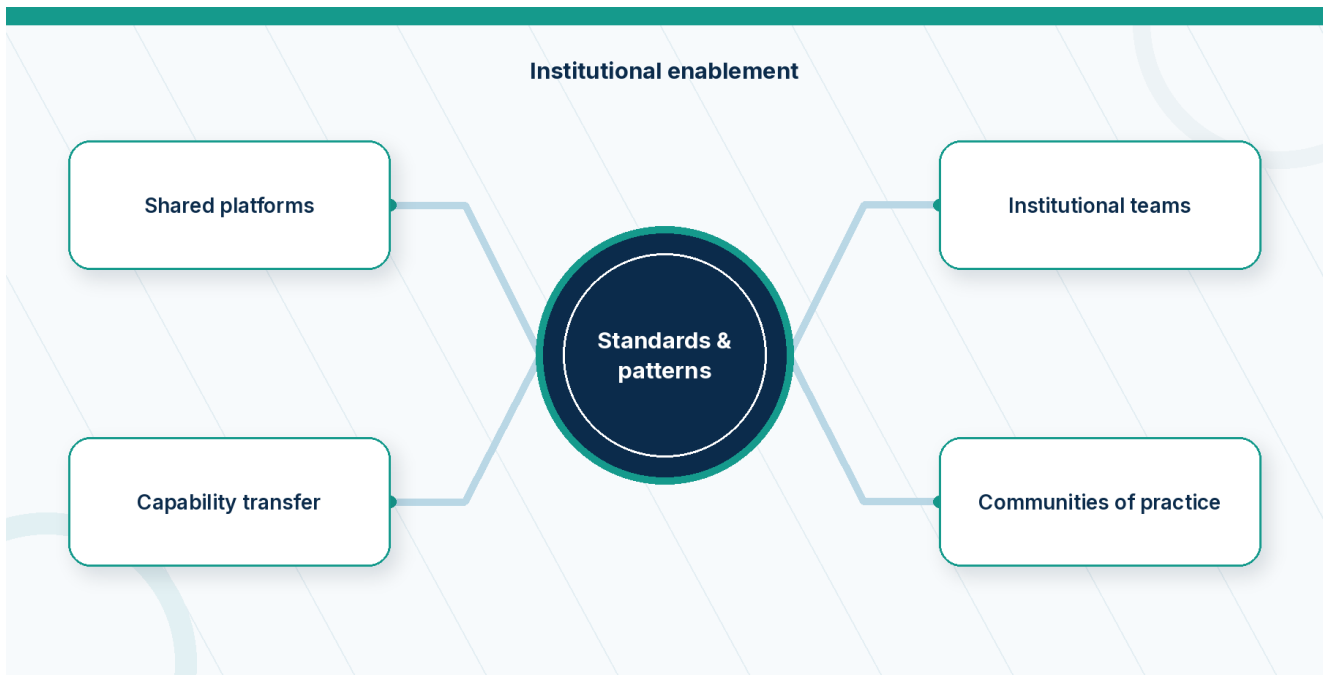


A national exchange model requires shared semantics, API standards, authoritative sources, consent rules, classification and traceability. Each data domain needs an accountable owner.

Institutional enablement

Build a strong center and capable institutions

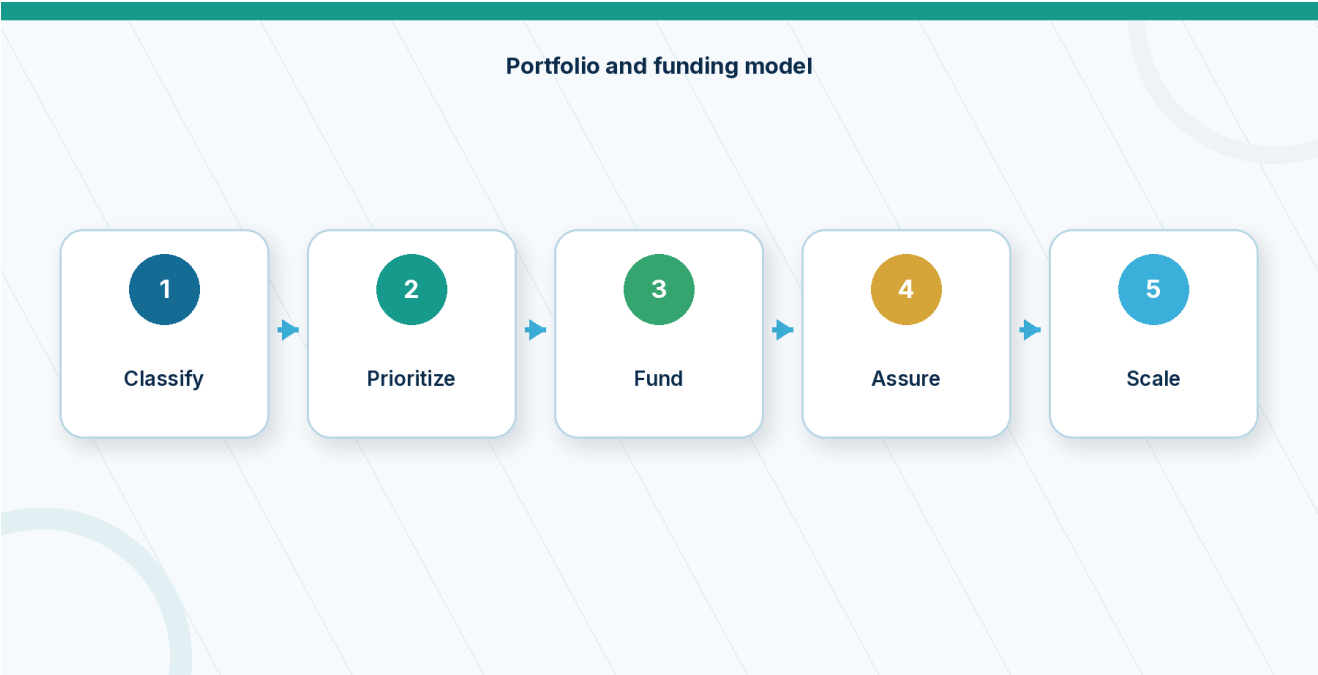


The center should provide standards, reusable platforms and specialist support. Institutions need empowered owners, product teams and the ability to configure and improve services locally.

Portfolio and funding model

Fund national capabilities—not isolated outputs

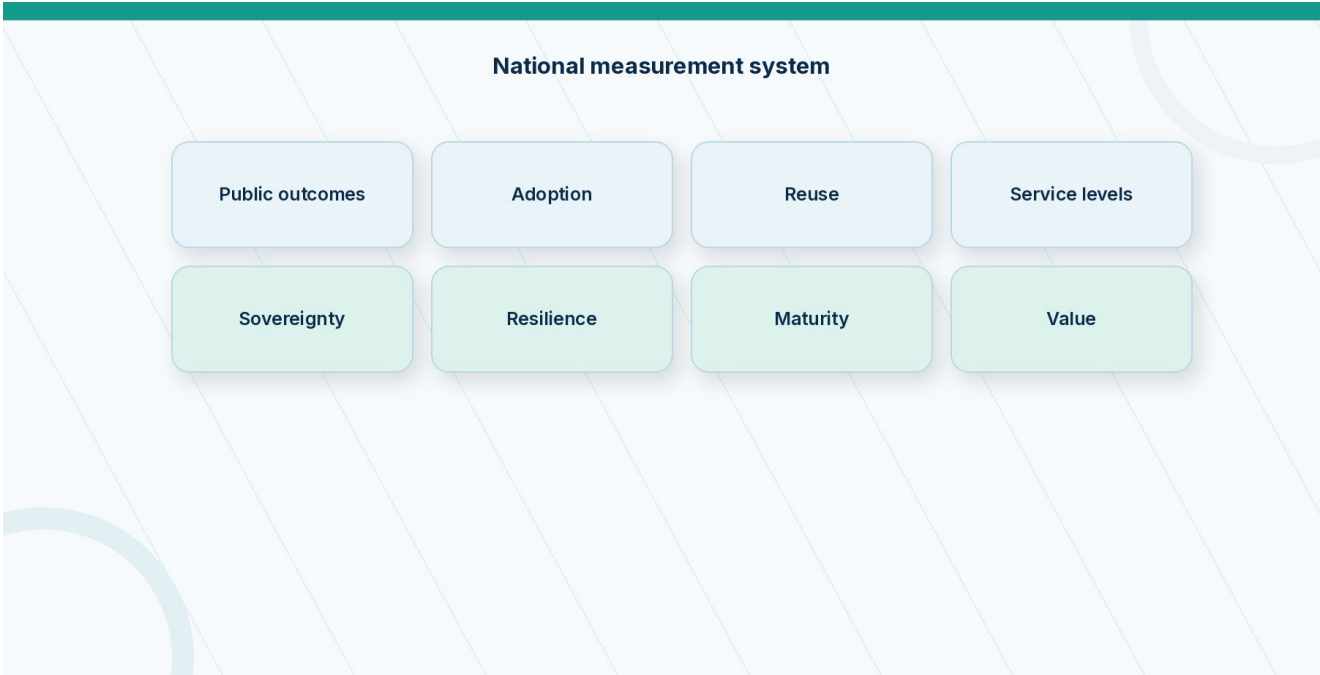


Classify initiatives as national foundations, cross-government journeys or institutional products. Release funding in stages against adoption, interoperability, risk and outcome evidence.

National measurement system

Measure compounding capability and public outcomes

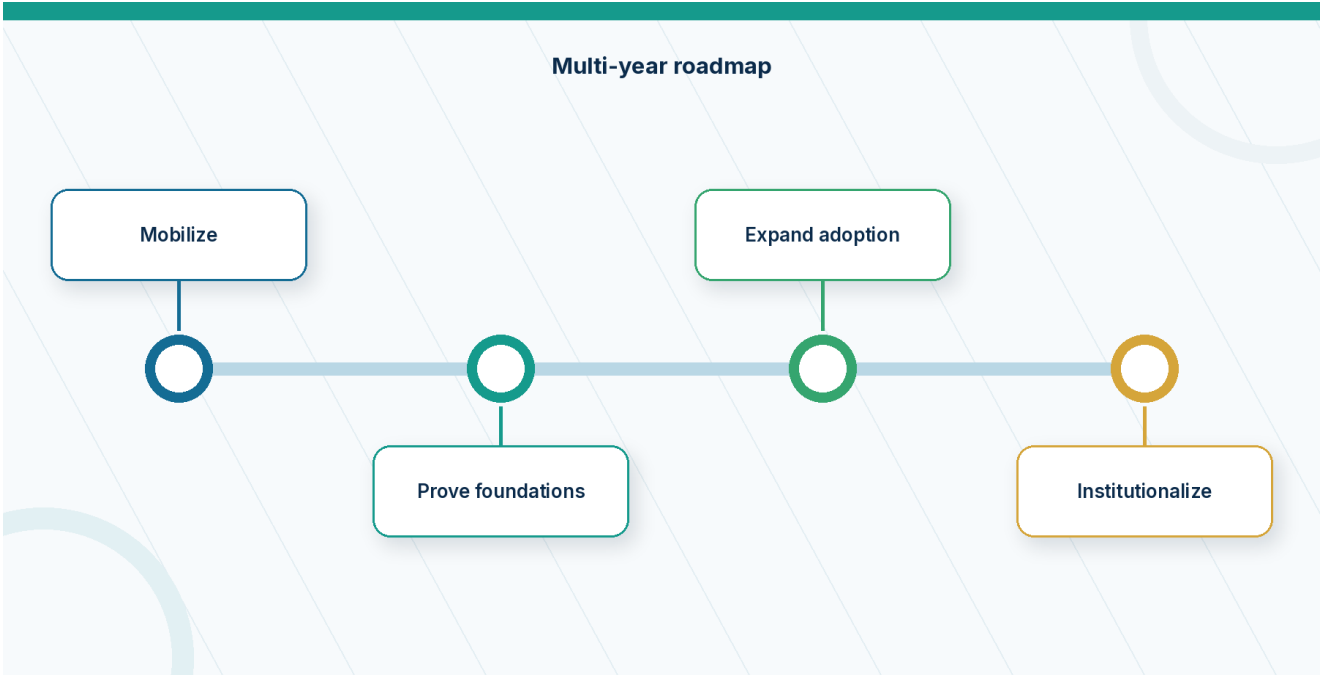


Combine outcome indicators with adoption, reuse, service performance, sovereignty, resilience and institutional maturity. Publish definitions and baselines to preserve trust.

Multi-year roadmap

Sequence foundations, adoption and institutionalization



Establish mandate and standards, prove shared foundations, expand priority journeys, then institutionalize portfolio learning and continuous modernization.

Use adaptable platforms beneath sovereign governance



National programs may use configurable workflow and case-management platforms such as ATMET within institutional or shared environments. Product choices must follow national architecture, security, data and procurement controls.
